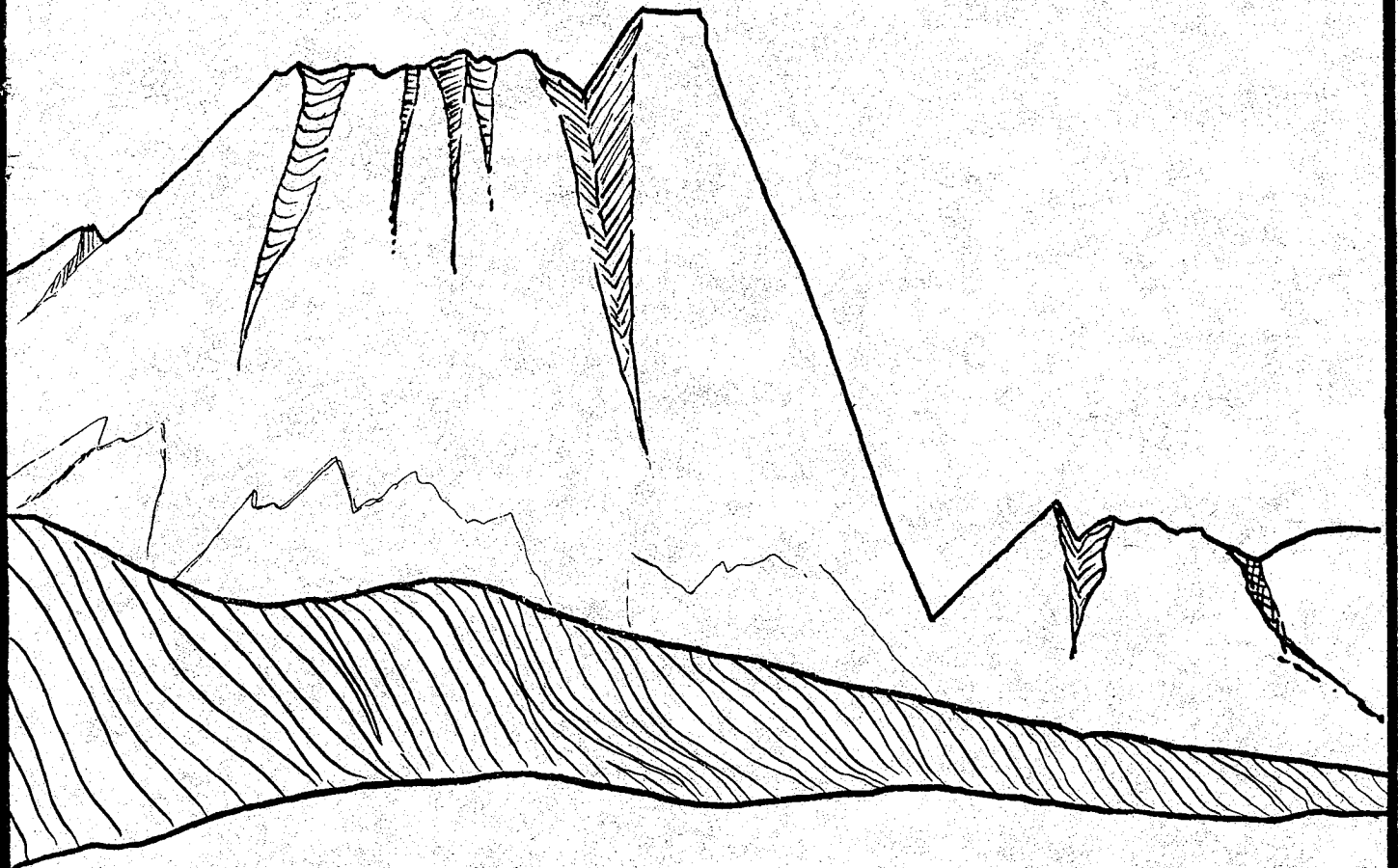

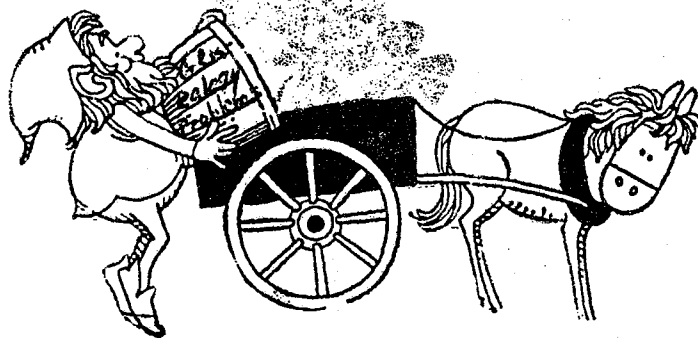
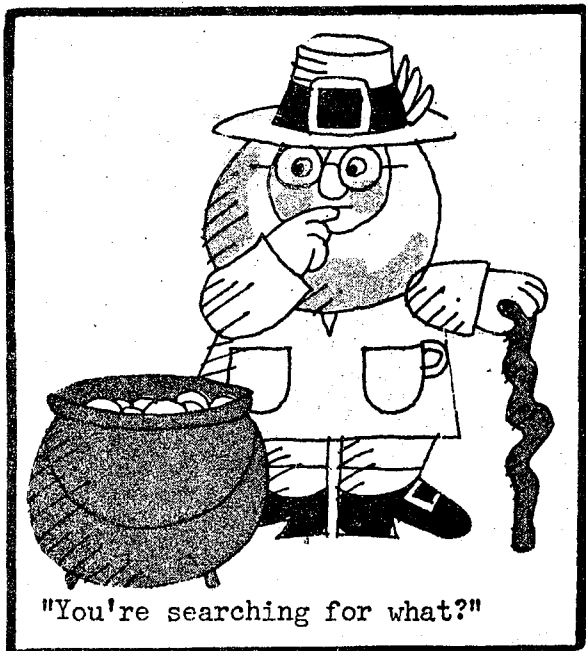

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greeting from the Broken Mountains Genealogical Society! Our society was formed two years ago by a group of about a dozen local individuals who were interested in finding out more about their "roots". Our name comes from the most pronounced landmark in our area, the Sweetgrass Hills. These hills were originally named "Broken Mountains" by Lewis and Clark. However, verbally the French-Canadian trappers called them "Montagnes du Foine de Senteur" since they had heard the Indians refer to them as "Hills of Sweet Smelling Grass". Thus the

name Sweetgrass Hills came to be. Most of the members of the BMGS are within visual range of the "Broken Mountains".

The BMGS meets at 7:30 in the Liberty County Library on the first Thursday of every month except July, August, and September. New members who are interested in researching their family history are always welcome to come to our meetings.

The major undertaking of the BMGS during our first year was to make an indexed file system for each grave in our local cemeteries. By comparing the names recorded in the cemetery ledger books with the tombstone records that the members compiled by visiting the cemeteries, we were able to find many graves that were unmarked and also some that were not recorded in the cemetery ledgers.

During our second year our major endeavor has been the compilation of local oral histories. Under the leadership of Dr. Arthur Doleman and Mr. Larry Burt of Northern Montana College in Havre, the BMGS was able to obtain a grant from the Montana Committee for the Humanities to cover the cost of collection, transcription, and storage of the oral history tapes. A related article in this newspaper gives more details about this project.

During the past two years the BMGS has also helped to enlarge the genealogy section of the Liberty County Library, and through the efforts of our local librarian, Lilly Eveland, a microfilm reader-copier has been purchased for the library. These improvements have been a great boon to local "Genealogy Bugs".

This spring the BMGS hopes to sponsor an introductory seminar on genealogy. We hope to have several out-of-town speakers as seminar leaders.

Finally, our group has long talked about publishing a newsletter, and now we have finally reached our goal! We have decided to publish "The Seekers" twice a year to begin with, and expect to expand our editions as we become more experienced. Hopefully, the "luck of the Leprechauns" will be with us in our new undertaking!

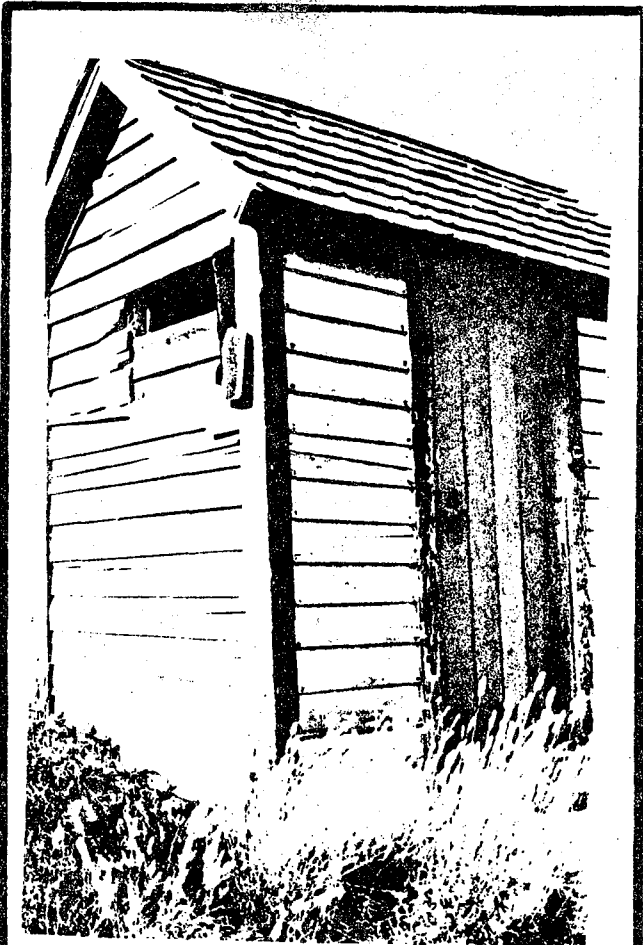

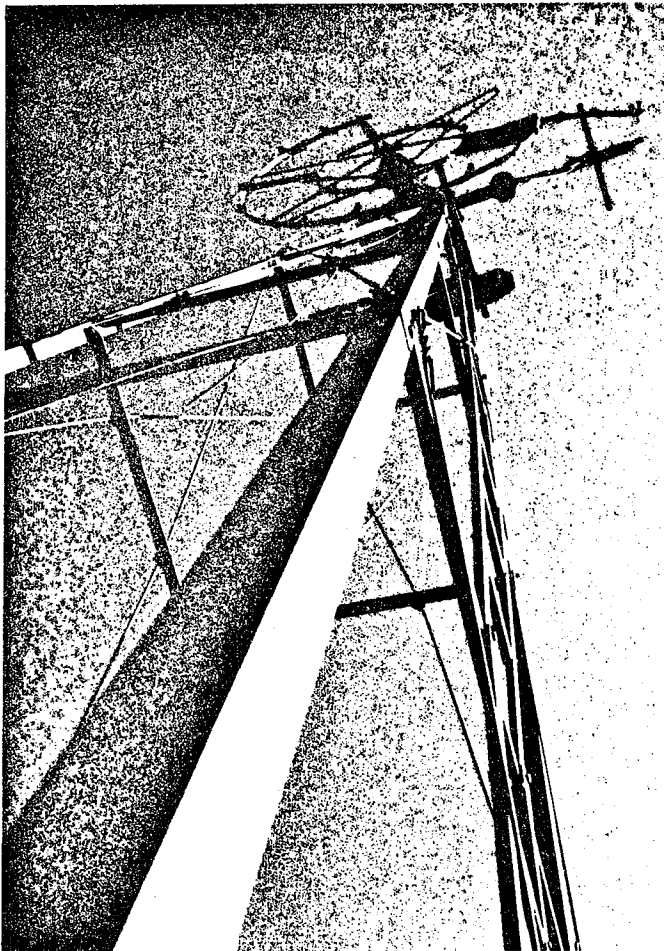

"HEIR RAISING STORIES"
by Gary Cady

The following articles are excerpts from the first six editions of the "Chester Signal" published in Chester, Montana in 1905:

Working girls are scarce in this country. The young ranchmen keep an eye out for them and gobble them up as fast as they appear. This country needs a few carloads of working girls to fill the demand!

These are some of the prevailing prices: Bulk coffee (18¢ lb.); 10 lb. pail of lard (\$1.35); Navy beans (6¢ lb.); ginger snaps (12½¢ lb.); Dozen oranges (40¢); box soda crackers (8½¢)

A new Montana law prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquors within five miles of any railroad grade, irrigating ditch or canal in the course of construction. A \$100 fine or 60 days in jail or both for the violation of this law will be levied; the law does not apply to cities and villages.

A recent census of Bengal reveals the fact that there are nearly 4000 baby girls in that province alone who have been married and of this number 600, all less than a year old, are widows.

William DAVIDSON, J. FORBES, William KNIGHT, T. STEWART, William LESLIE, William MAITLAND, and James LAIRD of Aberdeenshire, Scotland arrived here Wednesday morning to find homes in this vicinity. (From: Thursday, March 29, 1905 edition of "Chester Signal")

Early last fall Mrs. PUGSLEY accompanied by her mother and sister, started for San Francisco, but was compelled to stop at Spokane for medical treatment. Mrs. PUGSLEY was a young woman of many good qualities and her friends along the Marias will be much grieved to learn of her death. The body was shipped to San Francisco for burial. Thos. KINREAD and Livingston CRICHTON attended the funeral.

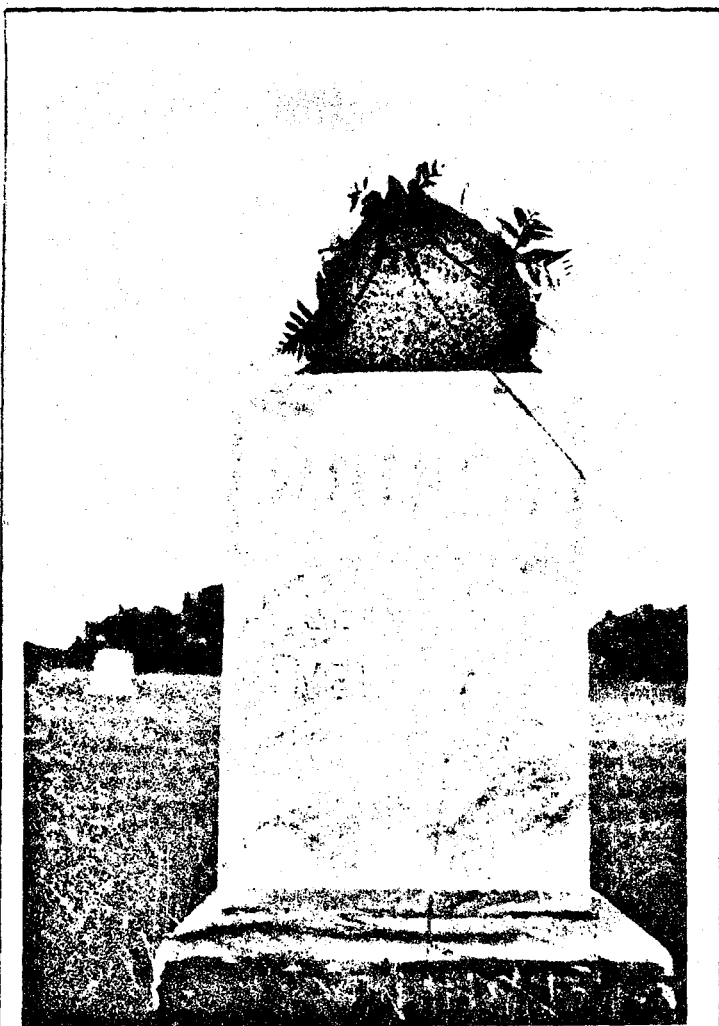
