


The FOOTHILLS PIONEER INDEX was begun in January 1990. It is an attempt to gather as many references as possible to the Pioneers of this area BEFORE 1920. At the present time (September 1990) the index contains references to 3600 persons who were known to be in the Foothills District. Information is being indexed from published sources, census, cemetery & vital records of the area, as they become available to us. It is hoped that we may be of some assistance to those family researchers who have an interest in the Foothills area.

Our pioneers came from all walks of life and many areas, including all areas of Canada, England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, European countries and the United States. At the moment we have chosen to notify all Canadian Family History Societies. In addition we have chosen societies in certain areas of the United States which reflect places of origin of our early pioneers.

The coverage for the Index is fairly extensive. Calgary, established in 1875 by the N.W.M.P., is the northern boundary. We extend as far south as the town of Nanton (&surrounding area), west to the slopes of the Rocky Mountains and east to Highway 23. The main communities which developed in this area were Midnapore & Fish Creek (now part of Calgary), Okotoks, DeWinton, Priddis, Blackie, Millarville, Black Diamond, Turner Valley, High River, Brant, Cayley, Longview & Nanton.

The Index is privately operated by three individuals, who have between them, 23 years of family history experience and access to a wealth of knowledge about the area in question.

The index covers a time period from c1870 to 1920, and should result in an index of enormous size. The project will not be finished overnight. We estimate it will take at least 5 years to

"Twenty miles west of the county seat, and on the main line of the Great Northern railroad lies Kremlin, the bustling, booming, growing trading center for the hundreds of homesteaders who have filed on 600,000 acres of highly productive chocolate loam soil."

This was the way Matt Casey, editor of the Kremlin Chancellor, described the town of Kremlin in a front page story over forty years ago.

And oldtimers say that Kremlin was every bit as good as Matt Casey described it. There were over 300 residents in the town, 33 places of business, a dozen telephones a "live wire" commercial club and even a volunteer fire department. But this was all in a day and age when Havre was a long, weary day's drive by a good team and wagon.

The first three men in Kremlin were Ted Oltesvig, K. C. Farley and E. C. Carruth. They came in the spring of 1909--when only a few squatters had taken up their claims on the yet unsurveyed land north and south of the Great Northern railroad tracks.

Oltesvig recalls that the only building at the location of present day Kremlin was a railroad section house. And just across the tracks from there began the first semblance of a town.

K. C. Farley, land agent and "first class land locator", platted the first townsite at about where the elevators stand today. Archie Parsons and Homer Spaulding opened Kremlin's first general merchandise store in the "Farley" addition.

E. C. Carruth owned an addition just to the east of the Farley townsite. He advised Oltesvig that he planned to build a "first class" town here. Oltesvig built a hotel and saloon, Kremlin's first, on the Carruth acreage. Parsons and Spaulding soon moved their store to this new location and the Farley addition died a

quick death.

In the spring of 1910 the first large contingent of homesteaders began to arrive. They came as many as 50 to a freight, unloading and stacking their belongings along the Great Northern right of way. Another large contingent arrived in 1911. These first squatters-- Barden, Bishop, Clark, Donovan, Wright, Donovan, Hagen, Johnson, Laughnan, Nelson, Scharfe, Sjordahl, Smith, Sorenson, Vosen, Vogel, Wilson, Wright, Dobie, Fenton, Baker, Cady, Casey, Dees, Erlandson, Erickson, Gilead, Havckjold, Hill, Howser, Kezar Koutnick, O'Connor, Purdy, Reum, Schucha, Swartout, Wall, Williams and others-- Hired their own surveyors to locate their claims. And some of them, after filing on land, moved off to squat on some more desirable tract which had been deserted. The homesteaders named above are still familiar names in Kremlin. A few of them are still actively engaged in farming, while others are now in second and even third generations.

And the town of Kremlin began to grow as the settlers continued to pour in. The Great Northern railroad constructed a depot in 1913 to handle the implement and equipment shipments that were arriving on every freight train. Ed Bohleg served as the first depot agent in Kremlin. The present agent, Charlie Petrie, has been on the job for over a third of a century.

The St. Anthony Elevator was constructed in 1911 to provide a ready market for the first crops of grain. Julius Larson was agent at the elevator for many years.

C. A. Carlson opened the first hardware store in Kremlin in the spring of 1912. This early day store and implement dealership was the largest on the HiLine in the early days. Its founder also served as notary public and justice of the peace for the Kremlin township. The building was destroyed by fire in 1919.

William B. Brookshire owned one of the first hotels and saloons in Kremlin. This spread was also destroyed by fire in the early years.

At various times during the early days Kremlin had as many as four general merchandise stores. The first was the Parsons-SpaULDING Store. Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Hilman opened a grocery store in 1913. The store continued under the same family management for over thirty years.

Other general merchandise stores included the Frank Hoerish store and Odin Sjordahl's store. Sjordahl became post master at Kremlin in about 1914. Hoerish served in this same capacity in later years.

J. B. Schlitz opened the first lumber yard in Kremlin in 1912. another yard, Roger Templeton lumber company, opened in 1913. It was managed by P. L. Burgeon.

H. Earl Clack, the pioneer Hi-Line grain and oil man, built an elevator in Kremlin in 1913. C. P. Black was the first manager. E.M. "Dick" Allison later arrived from Big Sandy to become agent of the firm. He remained in this capacity for 33 years before his retirement a few years ago.

Jewel Jensen, who resided in Kremlin for over twenty-five years, was the first postmaster. He later opened a hardware store and was the franchised McCormick-Deering dealer. Jensen sold the Mogul 8-16, a 16-horse-power oil burning tractor that retailed for \$675

Christ Vosen, one of the first homesteaders in the Kremlin area, and who is credited with opening the town's first blacksmith shop, sold his homestead a few years ago. Today he is in the blacksmith job that he began nearly a half century ago.

Mrs. Carl Sorenson owned and operated the first restaurant in Kremlin.

At one time Kremlin also had a doctor for a short time--Dr. Caley who did not remain for many years. Lewis Goshey owned the first automobile in Kremlin.

Matt Casey published the Kremlin Chancellor, the first and only paper Kremlin was to ever have. He was also active in the volunteer fire department, the Kremlin Commercial club and the first president of the fire department.

Casey reported in his paper: "The Commercial Club of Kremlin is a live wire organization that has been instrumental in securing for the town bridges across the Milk river, Sage creek and a system of good roads second to none in the county.

"Early day wheat yields reported in the Kremlin area included: Gus Renner, 42 bushels per acre; Oscar Erlandson, 44 bushels per acre; J. W. Nelson, 42 bushels per acre; Vernon Hill, 38 bushels per acre; Peter Horn, 36 bushels per acre; and F. M. Wilson, 36 bushels per acre.




**DOZENS OF POSTOFFICES AND SMALL
TOWNS SERVED THE HOMESTEADERS
AND RANCHERS**

With the settling of the vast rural area of Northern Montana

generally and Hill County specifically the necessity for mail service required many rural post offices. Wherever a post office was designated, usually the settlers would find a small general store, and these many times were the homes of some homesteader already settled in the area.

With the post offices established, the stage drivers made their regular runs through the area, often the only contact the isolated homesteaders had with the outside world.

Stages ran daily from Chester to Goldbutte via Hill and Whitlash. Twice a week mail

service was provided to Alma and once a week homesteaders would meet the stage driver at Marias.

Those settling along what now is known as the "Hi-Line" were provided with three hour mail service twice daily between Havre and Chester via the Great Northern Railway's Oriental Limited and Hi-Ball mail train.

Homesteaders and ranches relied on the stages for much more than mail service and many a driver would end up in Havre or Chester with a shopping list of hardware, medical needs, or groceries for these isolated people.

Rural post offices which served these homesteaders and ranchers in 1916 included:

Amos, located 20 miles northwest of Havre. Apostoffice and general store. A.C. Hardeth, Postmaster.

Alma, Mrs. Ina R. Keith, postmistress. This village also boasted of a school, blacksmith shop and general store.

Brinkman, George T. Bridges, postmaster.

Briggs, seven miles west of Chester, William D. Briggs, postmaster.

A general store was also in existence here.

Casady, a postoffice and general store, 18 miles northwest of Havre.

Wilda C. Casady, Postmistress.

Cottonwood, Postoffice, general store, and school 24 miles northwest of Havre. Thomas Connoley, postmaster.

Fairchild, postoffice and general store both operated by Florilla H. Miller.

George, fourteen miles south of Chester, Elva R. George, postmaster. There was a general store here also.

Goldstone, Frank J. Novak, postmaster. This community had a school, blacksmith shop and a church and was touted as "the fastest growing inland city in Montana."

Hill, Clara E. Tennison, postmistress. A general store at Hill served homesteaders in the surrounding area with everything from groceries to lumber, medical preparations to drygoods.

Lucerne, thirty miles northwest of Chester, C. M. Sweeney, Postmaster.

Laird, thirty four miles north of Chester, Lucy Laird, postmistress.


Miller, thirty miles northwest of Havre, J. B. Miller, was the largest "inland" town in northern Montana. It boasted of a general store, blacksmith shop, tavern, school, church and weekly newspaper.

OSCAR, a postoffice located 9 miles southeast of Havre, Oscar Lee, Postmaster.

SIMPSON, postoffice, general store, school, blacksmith shop, 21 miles north of Kremlin. Ed Fitch, Postmaster.

ST. JOSEPH, 16 miles north of Havre, postoffice. Frank Getschel, Postmaster.

SAGE, Ole C. Selmyhr, Postmaster.

TROMMER, Twelve miles northwest of Chester, Emily Phillips, postmistress.

WHITLASH, postmaster, Lester Allen Thompson. Whitlash looked like a sure bet to grow. Already established here were a general store, blacksmith shop, church, school and a hotel was contemplated.

FAIRCHILD

The Fairchild post office came into existence in January, 1913, on the homestead of Florilla Miller, 35-37-10. It was just across the road from the famous Peter Johnson sheep ranch. The post office was named for an early Governor of the state of Wisconsin.

The post office remained as the only fixed facility at Fairchild until 1921 when Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hayes of Gildford took over the post office and opened a general store. They operated the store for a number of years and then sold out to Fred Knopes, a graduate of Hingham high school.

Knopes continued to operate the store and served as post master until both the store and post office were discontinued in about 1929. James Miller, is reported to be the first homesteader to make the trip from Hingham to the Milk river, just north of Fairchild.

COTTONWOOD

In 1911 a post office was established 25 miles northwest of Havre on the Wild Horse Trail and it was named "Cottonwood" after a nearby coulee.

The office was served from Havre and mail was delivered via stage twice a week. Thomas Connolly was the first postmaster and served eleven years.

"On 'Mail Night' people came from all over the community to gather in the store where they visited and shopped and called for their mail. Mail nights were gala occasions then," wrote Mrs. Tom Connolly in a homesteaders biography "In The Years Gone By".

Later Mr. Connolly established a store, he kept two four-horse teams and wagons on the road all the time, one bringing supplies and another going for another load. in those days it was not at all unusual for a single order to amount to \$150.

A church was built at Cottonwood with the Reverend Moody as the first minister.

"In the spring of 1910 the country was a vast open space with only Tom's house located on Wild Horse Trail, between Havre and almost to the Canadian line.

"During the summer of 1910 the settlers poured in and by 1911 there was a homestead shack on almost every half-section and many who came hoping to file on land could find none vacant.

"The homesteaders or 'Dry Landers' as they were called had followed many different lines of work before coming to this community. They had been carpenters, painters, doctors, ministers, nurses, teachers, musicians, farmers, cowboys, sheep herders, butchers, merchants, engineers, but perhaps the most unusual was a deep-sea diver," continued Mrs. Connolly.

SIMPSON

Seeing the great need for a country store in the area, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Fitch of Simpson started the Simpson store on their homestead. In 1918 it was moved to the present location. The building was a dance hall, built by a group of local homesteaders that belonged to an organization called the "bachelor's club."

When the building was moved, a Mr. McDougall operated the store and postoffice, but closed it in 1918 when times were rough.

In 1920 the Fitch family reopened the store and continued to operate it until 1946. Mr. Fitch died in 1933, and at the age of 72 (1946) the postal department retired his wife.

The Fitch couple are still remembered for their generosity, sometimes extending so much credit when times were rough for the homesteaders that he would have to go to the bank for a loan himself.

GOLDSTONE

A post office was also established at Goldstone in the early days. By 1919 the community had a grocery store, cafe, hardware store and dance hall. Frank Novak was the first postmaster when the post office was opened in 1911.

The first mail to Goldstone was delivered via Alma but in later years was carried from Rudyard. The Fairchild post office was served from Gildford. Walter Peterson, a homesteader near Fairchild, carried the mail by wagon three times each week.

The coming of the railway was another invitation for people to build in towns. Many small towns of the main line died or the merchants moved their buildings and wares into the towns that sprung up as the rails were laid across the northern part of Montana.

By 1916 these towns were busy, thriving communities with every prospect of future growth.

Assinaboine, a station on the Montana Central Railway of Old Fort Assinaboine, seven miles southwest of Havre.

Pacific Junction track connection with the Great Northern Montana Central Line to Great Falls, Helena, and Butte, 4 miles west of the county seat.

Tiber, a station on the Great Northern Railway, west of Chester has a post office and general store. Wm. D. Briggs, postmaster.

Toledo a station on the Great Northern Railway, 7 miles east of Havre. A new town-site is being platted at the point and bids fair to make a town in the near future.

Laredo a station on the Great Northern Montana Central Line.



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

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
