

1920 CENSUS, available in March 1992, resembles that of 1910 in format and information. It did not, however, ask about the number of children born or how long a couple had been married. Four new questions were added; one asking the year of naturalization and three about mother tongue.

Census takers were not instructed to ask the spelling of names nor were they to request proof of age, date of arrival or other information. If family members were temporarily absent, they were to be listed with the family or on the last page for the census subdivision.

Census of 1920: For each person as of 1 January 1920: Place of abode: street name, house number, number of dwelling in order of visitation, number of family visited; name; relationship to head of family; whether home owned or rented; if owned, whether or not free of mortgage; sex; color or race; age; year of immigration to U. S.; naturalized or alien; if naturalized, year of naturalization; whether attended school since 1 September 1919; able to read or write; place of birth and mother tongue of person person's father and mother; whether able to speak English; trade or profession; industry, business, or establishment; whether employer, salary, or wage earner; farm schedule.

MARCH 2, 1892 THE RIVER PRESS, FORT BENTON, MT.

Wm. **COLLINS**, who brought Lewis **CAMPBELL** to this place a week ago Sunday, started for his home at the Sweet Grass Hills this afternoon. Before leaving, Mr. **COLLINS** and Kenneth L. **McKENZIE**, also of the hills, took out their final papers of citizenship in court. Mr. **CAMPBELL'S** broken limb is mending rapidly, and he expects to be able, in a couple of weeks, to return to the ranch.

Chas. M. **RUSSELL**, who will remain in the city until the **SPENCER** case is disposed of, informs us that he intends to start a saloon at Chinook, and devote his time to his artistic labors and the new venture at least until the spring round up begins, and possibly engage permanently in the business.

State Auditor E. A. **KENNEY** arrived from Helena last evening, bringing with him important books and official papers to be used by the grand jury in investigating the bounty cases. Frank A. **DOWD**, collector of customs at Sweet Grass, is also here to give his testimony in certain cases.

"THE RIVER PRESS" FORT BENTON, MT. March 2, 1892

Chas. M. **RUSSELL**, the "cowboy artist," executed some very neat pencil sketches in the court room this morning, while waiting to be called upon to give his testimony. It is the intention of the state board of world's fair commissioners of Montana to get **RUSSELL** to produce two large oil paintings, typical of western life, for a place in Montana's exhibit at Chicago. Charley is going to make an effort to outdo all his former productions; and although the labors of the master artists of all ages will be more realistic and true to nature than the specimens produced by the cowboy artist of Montana.

Robert MILLS, who is a well known old timer in Fort Benton, is visiting friends in this city for a few days. Mr. MILLS left this city for the Maiden mining district a dozen years ago, and for several year ran a hotel in Andersonville. He is now running a ranch at Lewistown and is prosparing. This is his first visit to Fort Benton in ten years, and he is the guest of Herman BRINKMAN.

COMMERCIAL CLUB

In October of 1909 a Commercial Club was formed. In the Chester Signal it did not say who were the officers. It only said the men at the head of the club were progressive. A committee was appointed on membership and generously offered to take in new members during the first month at the trifling sum of \$5 for initiation and all the dues for the first year.

The club appointed a committee to solicit funds for the purpose of having a town well drilled. At their first regular meeting A. C. **Strode** was elected treasurer. An excutive eommittee consisting of E. D. **Keith**, Ellis **Clayton**, Wm. **Mitchell**, H. E. **Loranger**, M. **Spangler**, W. V. D. **Chapman**, H. **Johnson**, Joe **Rehal** and B.B. **Weldy** was elected.

The following members were charter members: L. A. Nutt, M. Spangler, M. D. Reif, J. M. Burkhardt, E. D. Keith, S. C. Duvoll, A. C. Strode, C. E. Casper, C. B. Wellborn, E. E. Biggs, W. H. Melvin, H. S. Johnson, Thos. Smith, D. W. Brown, L. H. Christy, W. V. D. Chapman, R. H. McDonald, L.A. Conners, P. A. Peterson, John L. Barker, Shebel Rehal, C. S. Chadwick, G. D. Hartwell, Wm. Mithchell, M. A. Johnson, E. E. Loranger, Edw. Brosnan, J. B. Hay, J. Ed Wilson, C. A. DeLaGrange, H. C. Eversmeyers, B. B. Weldy, Ellis Clayton, B. H. Smith and Joe Rehal.

The biggest concern in 1913 was better roads and a bridge across the Marias.

The Club was re-organized in June of 1916. Officers elected were E. W. **Denison**, President; C. F. **Baker**, J. O. **Berglin**, C. S. **Davis**; L. R. **Crowell**, vice president; W. B. **Hawley**, secretary and J. N. **Harvey**, treasurer.

They were busy preparing for a visit of the Great Falls Commercial Club. The automobile excursion was to look over the route for the railroad that was being promoted between the Electric City and Chester.

After Chester became a county seat in 1920 the officers of the Chester Commercial Club were A. C. **Strode**, president; H. O.**Woare**, vice president; J. O. **Berglin**, secretary and John **Jacobson**, treasurer.

The main concern of the club was to work with the county commissioners to locate the most favorable route south to connect up with the main highway to Great Falls.

MODERN WOODMEN

The Modern Woodmen of America organized a lodge January 20, 1910 with thirty-seven charter members. The following officers were elected to direct the affairs of the new camp during the first year:

C. A. **DeLaGrange**, Ven. Consul; R. H. **McDonald**, Advisor; Ellis **Clayton**, Banker; B. S. **Kelly**, Clerk; Ed **Norris**, Inside Guard; Ben **Snuffer**, Outside Guard; A. **Mutt**; Ed **Keith** and H. S. **Johnson**, Managers.

The Woodmen purchased what was known as the Finn Hall in 1926. It was situated 12 miles northwest of Chester. They moved it to Chester and enlarged it. Later in the year the school rented it to hold their basketball games, carnival and other school functions. Other community affairs were held in it also. It also served as a movie house later on. Chester Implement used this building for storage. To update this article Jenning **Mattson** uses it for storage. In 1991.

IOOF LODGE

The new Odd Fellows Lodge was installed December 30, 1910. The new lodge was known as Ivy Lodge No. 90 and the following officers were elected: Noble Grand, Jake **Burkhart**; Vice Grand, Geo. **Hartwell**; Secretary, E. S. **Albright**; Treasurer, Geo **Myers**.

In 1926 the IOOF held their first meeting in their new hall which they had bought. The building was formerly a store and moving picture house. The Vets Club now occupies the lot. Election of afficers was held with the following installed: P. B. Perry **Oakey**; N. G. John **Jacobson**; V. G., John **Morgan**; W., Enair **Warnes**; Con., Frank **Eggers**; Chaplin, I. G. **Barker**; R.S.N.G., R.B. **Walden**; L.S.N.G., Hawley **Wymond**.

Mercy Lodge No. 64 of the Rebekah degree, IOOF, was organized May 17, 1911. The following officers were elected: Mrs. J. S. **Mitchell**, Noble Grand; Mrs. Geo **Ainley**, Vice Grand; Mae **Nutt**, Secretary; Beulah **Slade**, Treasurer. The new lodge started with twenty-one chartermembers

CHESTER 1897 POPULATION 16

FROM CHESTER REPORTER 3/18/1926

While in conversation with Judge **Spangler** the other day, he stated that he and Mrs. **Spangler** came here from Marion, Montana on March 10, 1897, or 29 years ago. At that time the population of Chester was 16 people and that B. B. **Weldy** was the store keeper and the main squeeze in the burg. Joe **Gagnon**, now of East Butte, was mailcarrier. In commenting on the pleasant winter we have had he remembered that the day they arrived, the thermometer was 40 below zero, and that from that time to this he has not seen such a warm open winter.

CHESTER TO HAVE BRICKYARD

CHESTER SIGNAL 5/12/1910

Chester is to have a brickyard and the cheapening of building material will mean a better constructed and more beautiful city.

Lucis **Bauer**, a brick manufacturer of Alberta, has been in the city several days looking things over and yesterday closed a deal with B. B. **Weldy** for the purchase of six acres of land adjoining the city on the north and he will at once get to work improving the land with the necessary equipment for the manufacture of high grade bric.

The clay is ideal and it is the intention of Mr. **Bauer** to burn an initial kiln at an early date. With a home bric yard there is no reason why there will not be many buildings: erected of the product and a much prettier city will be the result, to say nothing of the greatly lessened danger from fire.

Mr. **Bauer** also purchased a block of eight business lots near the depot and intends to improve them with bric business buildings when occasion demands.

CREAMERY FOR CHESTER

FROM THE LIBERTY COUNTY TIMES, OCTOBER 16, 1980

In November of 1906 B. B. **Weldy**, publisher of Chester Signal, started pushing for a creamery in Chester. Is there any reason why Chester should not have a creamery. NONE.

With splendid feed all around us we cannot see why a creamery should not pay a handsome profit to the stockholders and distribute many hundreds of dollars to our townspeople and the farmers living in the vicinity.

A creamery with 100 cows to begin with would pay from the very start and as the economy of operation and the profits drived by the patrons became known, the number of cows would soon be doubled and within a year be doubled and within a second time.

In August of 1907 he came up with a suggestion. He told about citizens of Eureka subscribing for \$5,500 of stock of the proposed creamery at that place and started immediately to erect the building. The amounts subscribed ranged from \$500 down to \$50, but the majority took \$100 worth of the stock. It was to be a model creamery plant and cost about one thousand dollars less than the amount subscribed.

Now, why cannot we do something to get the ball rolling in Chester? Twenty-five one hundred dollar and a couple five hundred dollar subscriptions would do the work, and the payment could extent over several months. A plant at this point would not cost as much as at Eureka account of not so much freight.

Arrangements for an establishment of a creamery were made in October of 1907 but not in Chester. It was to be located at Whitlash. He said the establishment of a creamery at Whitlash will postpone the one at Chester for a time as several subscribers to the Chester project were residents of the Sweet Grass Hills and have transferred their names to the home project.

Sometime in 1912 the creamery at Whitlash was closed down. The farmers and businessmen of Chester and vicinity signed up for the stock necessary to bring the creamery to Chester. The site selected was just east of the coulee and facing Adams Street.

The Chester Creamery Company was organized with the following officers: president, A. C. **Strode**; vice president, R. W. **Piling**; Secretary-treasurer, J. N. **Harvey**; directors, Dodds **Keith**, J. A. **McRae**, J. H. **Keeve**, L. D. **Pugsley**, Otto **Shepherd**, A. M. **Keith** and B. B.

Weldy.

Chester Creamery capitalized at \$6,000 of which \$3,500 subscribed. Incorporated by Otto **Shepherd,** John **Keeve**, L. D. **Pugsley**, D. W. **Wilcom**, B. B. **Weldy**, R. T. D. **Keith**, all of Chester, and William **Meldrum** of Alma.

The first churning was May of 1913. The name of the butter was called "Gilt Edge."

B.B. **Weldy** closed a deal early Monday morning whereby he transferred to G. J. **Johnson**, formerly of Joplin and C. G. **Merrill**, who has been with Albright's barber shop for some time and better known around town as "Fuz" about a half acre of land adjoining the north side addition to Chester, for the plant of a steam laundry that Messrs. **Johnson & Merrill** contemplate putting in at once.

Almost immediately after closing the deal for the land, the new owners got busy with the lumbermen and carpenters, and now the building is well under way and the new enterprise will be ready by next Monday to receive soiled linen and make it look like new. This is one of the public conveniences that the Signal has been boosting for during the past six months, and we believe it will prove a profitable investment, as at present it is almost impossible for any one to get satisfactory laundry work done in the city, and we always kick on sending away our money to help build up other towns when we could and should keep it at home to build up our own town.

JOPLIN, BIGGEST LITTLE TOWN

TAKEN FROM LIBERTY TIMES OCTOBER 16, 1980

Montana's "Biggest Little Town on Earth" came into being in the spring of 1910 when settlers began to arrive to establish "squatters' right" on the thousands and thousands of virgin acres that lay in ranges seven and eight.

In 1909, according to early day accounts by pioneer settlers, all that occupied the townsite of present day Joplin was a lonesome section house that was maintained by the Great Northern Railway Co.

A gradual building of the town began in earnest in 1910 and continued to gain momentum as more and more settlers poured in. By 1912 most of the land in the immediate vicinity of Joplin had been filed upon and newly arriving settlers were pushing northward toward the Canadian border.

By the year 1915 Joplin was bursting out at the seams with development. The still infant town was being hailed as "the fastest growing city in the United States." It was in 1915 that the slogan, "The Biggest Little Town On Earth," came to be associated with Joplin.

Great Northern Coal Chutes Burn: The pump house caught fire today at 2:45 and for a time, the whole town of Joplin was threatened. The Brave work done by the bucket brigade was indeed what saved the hotel building and the rest of the town. 10/14/11

Weldy calls for organization of a volunteer fire dept. "A few long ladders, locked on the outside of several buildings in town and a closet with a couple dozen pails close by that could be easily broken open in time of need would go a long way in extinguishing the flames if found in time. We should not wait until the horse has been stolen before arranging to lock him up, do it now!"

Mr. **Blair** of the Northern Montana Telephone Co. was in town unloading telephone poles and making arrangements for putting in an exchange here. There are 20 subscribers in the town besides those who have subscribed for farmer lines. 9/14/12

JOPLIN TOWNSITE P ATENTED: Col.**Tolley** has been smiles all week and the cause was that he had received the patent for the townsite from Uncle Sam. Now he will be issuing deeds for lots sold and selling remaining ones. 10/5/12

But let's take hold and be less sad, there's lots in life to make us glad.


