
MEETINGS: Meetings are held the first Thursday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Liberty County Library in Chester, Mt.

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The following article on the Bingham Family came from the Hertiage Book put together by the Liberty Museum in 1976. It is used with the premission of the Museum Board. Thank you.

## BINGHAM FAMILY

Nelson Hamilton Bingham came to the Sweetgrass Hills in 1901 from Port Huron, Michigan. He had worked for the Hudson Bay Company in Saskatchewan and Manitoba trading with the Indians. He was very impressed with the grasslands of the prairie and decided to move his family from the small farm in Michigan and take up a homestead in the beautiful Sweetgrass Hills area. He went to work for Pat Buckley in the Sweetgrass-Coutts area to learn the sheep business. In 1902, his son James or Jim came west to help his father settle. They bought out some squatters by the name of Fox and Moltz. The International boundry survey had not been approved, but when it was the Binghams had 2 1/2 miles of Canadian fence on the north. Some of the settlers were not so fortunate. They suddenly found they were Canadians. The land had a good spring where the log cabin was located. The early day Indians would use it as a stopping place on their way into Canada. The earlier settlers reported that an Indian women was killed at the springs in a hail storm.

When Jim decided to come west he didn't want to spend his precious money on railway fare. He and a friend, Bob Johnson, found a railway car on the Canadian Pacific loaded with immigrants belongings, including a cow, that looked like a good ride. Along the way Jim developed a bad case of Quinsey. At Regina when the train stopped he found a doctor who lanced his throat and he continued on to Lethbridge and Coutts. He always claimed the fresh milk from the cow saved his life.

Nelson's wife, Nora Fulton Bingham (third cousin of the Steamboat Fulton) and daughter Mabei came west as soon as possible and all filed homestead claims. Nelson H. had purchased sheep with the holdings and ran them in the summer north of Galata, lambing and wintering them at the ranch. The sheep were sheared "down on the flats" with Nora, Achsa or Mabel going down to cook for the shearing crew.

The first year or two the mail was gotten from Fort Benton by horseback, but soon a route was established to the post office at Laird.

The Bingham ranch has been in three counties: Chouteau, Hill and Liberty. Mabel Bingham entered a contest in 1908 from the Havre Newspaper and won first prize of a trip to Europe. This was a very great prize. She enjoyed touring France, Italy, Great Britian and many other places with Cook and Sons as tourist guides.

The neighbors were Lairds to the east and Iversons and Wallaces west, Schafers were south as were the Laueners. When the home folks wanted an outing they would ride horseback or take a buggy and go from one neighbor to the other for several days to visit.

The staple groceries were ordered from the ranch through an agent of John W. Sexton Co. of

Chicago, who traveled from home to home. Every thing was purchased in case lots and freighted home by wagon teams once or twice a years from Chester. Nora Bingham's definition of a good cook was one who could take what was on hand and make a good meal. She, Mabel and Achsa were past masters in this field.

Coal was the main fuel and sometimes mined by hand and hauled from a spot on down Police Coulee. The ranch is located at the head of Police Coulee. Later years it was hauled from the mine at West Butte or from Taylor's mine in Canada.

In 1905, Jim married Achsa Parsell. Achsa (pronounced Axa) had been born in Brock, Nebraska, and came west when one year old with her parents and several families in emigrant cars, to settle in Heppner, Oregon. When she was four years old, her father died of typhoid fever, leaving her Mother a widow and with seven children. Ollie, Fred and Roy were the oldest, and helped earn the living for the family. Fred and Roy came to the Sweetgrass Hills in the 1890's to shear sheep, and eventually settled as did Harvey and Chet. Harvey eventually moved to Dillon and Roy to Sprague, Washington. Achsa came to visit her brothers in 1903, and worked in the area as a cook for Morris Price on the "company" ranch, south of Whitlash. She cooked for Mr. Dohrs, who owned the land the Iversons now have, when Jim claimed her for his cook.

Nelson H. and Nora Bingham retired in 1911, and moved to Spokane, Washington to make their home, selling their interest to Jim and Achsa in 1914. Jim bought out other homesteaders, as they decided to leave, to enlarge the ranch.

In 1911, Jim had appendicitis, and was rushed to Great Falls. He went by buggy to Chester, by train to Havre, then onto Great Falls. While he was in the hospital recuperating from the operation, Achsa gave birth to Nelson G.; Olive Katherine came along two years later. When the flu epidemic hit in 1918, Jim and Walter Wuotila had gone to Chicago with a shipment of livestock. They were both stricken there, and went to see a doctor. He told them to get home as fast as possible, as the people were dying like flies. By the time they arrived home, they were both pretty sick.

Jim seemed to have such a hard time recuperating from the flu. He decided to sell the sheep and lease the ranch. In 1919, they loaded belongings in a railroad car at Galata, including the team, and Jim's favorite saddle horse, Silver, and shipped them to Kalispell. The family moved to a small farm near Kalispell, where Olive and Nelson could go to school.

Jim leased the ranch to Grant Acher, who had been raised with Jim near Port Huron, Michigan. Grant had married a local girl, Elizabeth Wuotila from Aden, Alberta Community. Grant soon developed asthma, and had to give up his lease on the Bingham ranch in 1921. They eventually settled in Tacoma, Washington where the climate agreed with Grant. The two families are still close friends. The Archer homestead is still owned by the heirs of Grant and Lizzie in Flat Coulee area.

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In 1921, the Binghams moved back to the ranch, with Jim buying cattle in Kalispell and shipping them by rail home. Old Silver seemed to know where he was going, and didn't make any fuss getting into the boxcar to come home. He didn't like the timber country.

Olive and Nelson attended Bear Gulch School. It was four miles from home, held in the summer months. Some terms were only three months, some four or five. The school consisted of Anna and Carl Iverson, Nora and Jimmie Townshend and Olive and Nelson. Sometimes there were other pupils for a short time. For Nelson, school meant getting up early to wrangle the horses and milk cows, saddle up the horses or hitch up the buggy, if the teacher was staying at Bingham's. When they arrived at school the horses had to be taken care of and watered at noon. Hitched up again after school for the trip home.

In the early days of Bears Guich School the district was so small they didn't have enough territory for a tax base to support more than three or four months of school. Jim got out a petition to transfer some land from the Laird district to Bear Guich. This enabled Bear Guich to hold a longer term each year.

Jim was always interested in community and government affairs and always had fun wherever he went with his lively jokes and quickwit. He was especially enthused about the developing oil and gas discoveries in the area. Some of his enthusiasm must have rubbed off on his son, Nelson, for when he was only about ten or twelve years old he rigged up his first drilling rig. A tripod with a piece of rope and a pulley at the top with a piece of iron as his bit and 2" casing for his baler. He drilled a hole 15' deep, probably as long as his rope was. He and Carl liverson then rigged up one at Carl's place and drilled one 15' deep there. Both boys had an early start in the drilling business! The Harold Brown gas well was one of the first gas wells drilled by the Gladys Bell Company. The Western Natural Gas Company had drilled gas wells on the Wallace and Townshend places. A gas line was laid from the Sweetgrass Hills into Great Falls by Montana Dakota Utilities and gas had been sold from the Whitlash field by the end of 1930. Montana Power Company bought these holdings in the 50's, and built a compressor station at Whitlash. Wells have been added to the system over the years from Grandview, Utopia field, Haystack Butte area, Flat Coulee, East Keith Field, Mt. Lily, Blackjack and Whitlash in Liberty County, and many wells from Canada and northeast Toole County. To date, approximately 108 billion cubic feet of gas has been produced and marketed from Liberty County. In 1926 oil was discovered on the Hick's place and a year or two later in Flat Coulee. Many oil wells have been

developed in north Liberty County with Western Natural Gas Company most active in the early days. A.W. Patterson of Spokane, Washington was the president of the company with George Lane as manager in the field. In the early 30's there wasn't much of a market for the crude that had to be hauled to Kevin or Sunburst to the refinery or Chester to be shipped by rail. Lots of the high grade crude was sold to American and Canadian farmers for \$1.00 or \$1.25 a barrel, to be used as fuel for their tractors in the depression years. They would burn it straight and never had to buy any lubricating oil as it would fill the crankcase too full every day. They never had motor trouble using the crude, but needed to carry two or three extra sets of spark plugs. When A. W. Patterson retired, the management of the Western Natural Gas Company went to Gail White of Anaconda with Carl Iverson as manager in the field, pumping the wells and carrying on the drilling program. Carl Iverson reserved part of the holdings of Western Natural Gas Company which is very active yet today in northern Montana.

Quite a few of the farmers and ranchers made themselves crude refineries and refined their own gasoline. It would ping in the motor when pulling up hill, but was cheap fuel in the days when you had to stretch your dollars.

Over the years many wells have been drilled-some producers-some dry holes, but all reveal some important facts of the structure to help understand what took place deep in the earth many thousands of years ago.

Many big companies and small have contributed to the development of this industry in Liberty County where according to the statistics, from the Board of Oil and Gas conservation, The Whitlash, Flat Coulee, Laird and Bear Den fields have produced 6,431,000 barrels of oil and sold for \$17,253,565.00 as of January 1, 1975. The taxes paid to Liberty County on the gas and oil pipelines as well as the natural gas and crude oil have added considerably to the monetary gain for all of the people of Liberty County in the tremendous tax take from this industry. Nelson Bingham and Carl Iverson, who started when they were kids with their toy rig have always had a keen interest in geology and development of oil and to date have developed over 125 wells either alone or with other interested owners.

Grandparents Bingham lived in Spokane until Granddad died in 1928. Aunt Mabel Townshend had not been well for a couple of years and after Granddad died Grandma Bingham leased her home and came to live with the Townshends.

William Townshend came to the Sweetgrass Hills early in the 1900.s from Dillon, Montana as foreman for Poindexter and Orr Cattle Company. He bought a place on Bear Gulch Creek and was in partnership with Tom Maynaise until he and Mabel Bingham were married in 1910, at which time the partnership was dissolved. They resided on their ranch raising their two children

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there. Nora was born in 1913 and James (Jimmie) in 1917. Both attended Bear Guich School with some school time spent in Spokane with Grandparents Bingham. Mabel was always active in the community. She organized the first Westminister Guild, a youth fellowship of the church. She organized a sewing club for the young girls of the community and was active in the Ladies Club. Will Townshend was noted for his dry wit and his ability to play his viloin. Mabel's illness with cancer was steadily getting worse in spite of anything the doctors could do and she slipped away in 1930 at the age of 50 years. Grandmother Bingham stayed with the Townshend family until 1937 when Will sold the ranch to Jim Bingham. She then came to the Bingham ranch to make her home.

Will Townshend passed away in 1939. Nora married John Engstrom of Chester and they had two sons, James and John Roger. Nora settled in Missoula, Montana. Jimmie Townshend married Mabel Edwards of Lothair and they had three children. William(Bill), Byron and Pamela. They now live in Carmichael, California, Johnny and Gladys Morrison now own the Townshend ranch. Jim Bingham became ill with a brain tumor and died in Rochester, Minnesota in August of 1940. Grandmother Bingham passed away in 1943. She had buried her husband and both of her children.

Olive Bingham married Alvin Roberts in 1931 in Spokane and they and their two sons Larry and Lyle moved to the Townshend ranch in 1937

. Son Ronnie was born in 1939. In 1944 they moved to Bozeman where daughter Marilyn was born in 1946. In 1948 they moved to Anchorage, Alaska where Olive and two of her children now live. Olive was a beauty operator for many years. Ronnie was killed in a plane accident in 1960. Larry resides in California. Alvin died in 1971. Achsa Bingham lived at the ranch with some time spent in Bozeman until 1948 when she moved to Shelby. She lived in Shelby, making several trips to Alaska, until 1971 when she was unable to live alone any longer. She celebrated her 93rd birthday in the Liberty County Nursing Home in March of 1976. Nelson and Beva Lester of Kalispell were married in 1937 and have made their home on the ranch. They raised sheep for a nunber of years, but now raise Black Angus cattle. In 1951 Nelson bought a rig with a partner and started to pursue the oil business in earnest. They have three daughters, Carol, who married Marvin Belcher and lives in Spokand with their four children, Jerry, Danny, Carrie and Ricky. 9 Dec. 1909 - C.H. Drake, who owns drug stores at Choteau, Conrad, Valier and Cut Bank and is the principal owner of the Teton County telephone system, was in town the fore part of the week looking over the business situation with an eye on the phone business. Mr. Drake informed THE SIGNAL man that he intends putting in a drug store at Shelby after the first of the year and may extend his operations to Chester if conditions warrant it in the spring.

16 Dec. 1909 - Dr. and Mrs. Melvin expect to move into their room this week in the rear of their new drug store.

6 Jan. 1910 - Showcases and furniture arrive for Dr. Melvin's drug store.

2 Feb. 1910 - W.H. MELVIN, M.D., PHYSICIAN & SURGEON Office at the Prairie Inn

10 March 1910 - Chester Drug Company purchased from Dr. Melvin by R.H. Fuller, prescription druggist.

17 March 1910 - Dr. Melvin expects a new Hudson car at an early date.

7 April 1910 - Dr. Melvin is erecting an office between the Strode store and the drug store.

19 May 1910 - Roy Fuller who has had charge of the Chester Drug Company for some time past, resigned several days ago and returned to Havre with his wife.

16 June 1910 - The Chester Drug Co. is well represented and their line is in keep- ing with the space they take. The store is well stocked with goods to heal the sick and a line to make the happy happier. Drop in and see.

10 March 1911 - Chester offers a splendid opening for a competent dentist.

11 May 1911 - Dr. Mayland has decided to locate in our city and will open an office in a short time.

15 July 1911 JOPLIN TIMES - The surgeons succeeded yesterday in removing the rifle ball from the foot of young Bert Meader. The lad is doing nicely now.

12 Aug. 1911 - Dr. T.A. Ewart has just completed a barn on his homestead west of town.

21 Sept. 1911 CHESTER SIGNAL - Dr. and Mrs. Melvin sell Chester Drug Company to J. Clausen from North Dakota.

Dr. Melvin has recovered from the appendectomy with complications that he underwent several months ago. Even though he has sold his drug store, they will remain in Chester.

Dr. Ewart, the dentist, will leave Chester Saturday, September 9th. Anyone wishing to have dental work done better arrange for a date before that time.

19 Oct. 1911 - Dr. A.A. Pastene left Friday for Boston to be gone four or five months.

14 Jan. 1912 - Dr. R.B. Shrock who is associated with Dr. Hamilton in Fort Benton has come to Chester to open a dental parlor and is getting things in shape over the First State Bank.

9 Feb. 1912 INVERNESS INDEX - Dr. Mayland, doctor from Chester, treated a child north of Joplin recently.

15 Feb. 1912 CHESTER SIGNAL - Dr. Husser was in town Friday while on his way from California to Chicago. He will return in April and begin a practice here.

29 Feb. 1912 - TRAINED NURSE. Fourteen years experience at Fort Assinniboine. Experienced in all sorts of cases and have the best of recommendations. Mrs. M. Furlong, at the residence of E.R. Furlong, Chester, Mont.

4 April 1912 - Drs. T.A. Ewart and A.A. Pastene are in Helena this week taking the state medical examinations.

6 June 1912 - Dr. A.A. Pastene has opened up an office in the building formerly occupied by Haley and Gorman on Washington Avenue.

13 June 1912 - A.A. PASTENE PHYSICIAN & SURGEON CHESTER, MONTANA

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20 June 1912 - DR. L.L. MAYLAND PHYSICIAN and SURGEON Office over First State Bank CHESTER, MONTANA

14 July 1912 CHESTER DEMOCRAT - TRAINED NURSE Mrs. Furlong is again at the residence of her son, E.R. Furlong and will be ready to answer calls at any time. Mrs. Furlong is a graduate of an institution in England and has had a lot of practice at the old Fort Assinniboine, as a trained nurse and physician. She has been very successful in her practice and will always be ready for duty.

31 Oct. 1912 - VOTE FOR DR. PASTENE FOR CORONER. It will save expense.

12 Dec. 1912 - Dr. Pastene has moved his office to the building recently occupied as a photograph gallery on First Street.

26 Dec. 1912 - Dr. Mayland's stocking seems to have had a hole in it. Taft handed him the Chester postmastership, but Senator Meyers says it belongs to one of the faithful.

24 April 1913 - Ralph Wilson has returned from the east and is now employed at the Chester Drug Store.

Dr. Buisson returned from the East on No.3 this morning and will resume his practice of dentistry along the Hi-Line.

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NOTE: Dr. Daniel Buisson died at Townsend, Montana in August of 1958 at the age of 78 years. He homesteaded near Havre, practiced dentistry there for a number of years, and at one time in the early teens had a dentist office in what is now the bank building in Chester.

HISTORY OF MONTANA, VOL.II by Helen Fitzgerald Sanders 1913 WHEELER H. MELVIN, M.D. In a new community the services of none of the professions are so much required as those of the physician. Practically at the founding of the now thriving town of Chester, there located among the merchants and other citizens, Dr. Wheeler H. Melvin, who has offered his skill to this community and has not only been a successful physician, but has gained a large influence in the citizenship of this locality.

Dr. Melvin was born in Vernon county, Wisconsin, May 20, 1882 and received his preliminary education in the public schools at Chashton, Monroe County, of his native state. His preparation for the profession of medicine was in the College of Physicians and Surgeons, at Chicago, then the medical department of the University of Illinois where he was graduated M.D., June 6, 1905. His first practice was in Taylor, Wisconsin for three months, and then for three years in Beach, North Dakota. In 1909 he established his office in Chester, and has since attended an increasing practice and has acquired some good property in this vicinity.

Melvin's father was Winfield Scott Melvin, who was born in Ohio in 1846 and has been a resident of Wisconsin since the fifties, being one of the substantial farmers of that state. The mother was Hannah (Snider) Melvin, a native of Pennsylvania whence her family emigrated to Stevens Point, Wisconsin. She died in 1891 at the age of thirty-two. The doctor was the third of their six children, the others being named as follows: Philo H.; Mrs. Nellie Stewart, of Lothair, Montana; and Misses Katie, Beulah and Ruby.

Dr. Melvin married at Beach, North Dakota October 16, 1906, Miss Etta May Caldwell, and to them on April 29, 1912 was born a son, Wheeler William Scott Melvin. The doctor is a member of the blue lodge in Masonry and the Modern Woodmen of America, and belongs to the American Medical Association and is a secretary of the Chester Board of Health. He is a Progressive Republican, and his wife has membership in the Congregational church.

24 July 1913 - Dr. Pastene purchased the building formerly occupied by Biggs & Johnson as a lumber office and has had it moved to a site next the meat market and will fix it up for his office and added another room.


7 Aug. 1913 - Mrs. Alfred Hicks has returned to her home in the Sweet Grass Hills after treatment at the Chester Hospital.

## A. A. PASTENE



The newlyweds will make Chester their home and we join in the heartiest congratulations and very best wishes.

16 July 1914 - The stock of drugs and the fixtures formerly belonging to the Corner Drug Store were sold to Druggist Clausen of Chester and the Joplin Drug Company, and everything was moved from the room formerly occupied by the concern by the purchasers this week.

15 Oct. 1914 - Last Sunday Dr. Pastene arrived in town after an absence of several months which he spent taking lectures on medicine and surgery in New York and Boston.

12 Nov. 1914 - The painters are putting the finishing touches on Dr. Melvin's new house this week.

7 Jan. 1915 - A delegation headed by Dr. Melvin went down the line Tuesday working on county cecession affairs.

11 Feb. 1915 - Dr. Buisson and wife, who have been in Minneapolis and other places for the past six weeks, returned to Chester Tuesday. The doctor is now

busily at work in his dental parlor and it will be some time before he can get caught up with his delayed work and get back on regular schedule.

11 March 1915 CHESTER SIGNAL - Dr. Pastene is having his machine (auto) repainted and put into shape for the coming season. Charles Schoonover is doing the work.

30 April 1915 - Dr. Melvin is planting trees around his spacious home this week and is also otherwise beautifying the grounds.

June 1915 - C. Ralph Wilson working at the Chester Drug Store.

Pastene is improving his office residence by a new coat of paint. He has also added a new summer porch and other additions which has added much to the beauty and appearance of his residence as well as his office.

Dr. Ewart received a telegram yesterday announcing the death of his mother, which occurred on that day at Wyoming, Ontario. On account of full particulars are lacking, we are unable to give same, but will publish complete obituary when the Doctor returns, having left for home Tuesday evening on No.4.

28 April 1916 - Bruce Vredenburgh, an expert pharmacist has accepted a position at the drug store of J.K. Clausen.

17 Nov. 1916 - Dr. Ewart bought the Presbyterian manse this week.

November 1916 CHESTER DEMOCRAT - HEALTH REGULATION - Town of Chester NOTICE is hereby given that all ash heaps, rubbish or litter are ordered removed on or before April 20, 1917.

Further ordered that all privies must be repaired or so constructed as to be fly-proof and sanitary in conformity with Health Regulations.

Slops and garbage must be kept in fly-proof metal covered containers. It is ordered that you supply yourselves with such.

5 April 1918 - LOCAL OVERFLOW-

Dr. Ewart had the misfortune of running into a large hay stack on his way to answer a call in the country. The hay stack was completely demolished. The Doctor's flivver is still intact.

16 Aug. 1918 - Four Nurses Enlist from Chester - Lillian Houck, Eva Erickson, Esther Bieber, and Ella Caldwell.

November 1918 - There were so many deaths from the "Spanish Influenza" - also alot attributed to pneumonia which very frequently was an aftermath. Washington reported that the recent epidemic of influenza in the United States caused more deaths than occurred among the American Expeditionary Forces from all causes from the time the first unit landed in France until hostilities ceased.

29 Nov. 1918 - Mrs. Lillian English is acting as nurse at the CHESTER HOTEL, where there are fourteen cases of influenza.

6 Dec. 1918 - Last Saturday when returning to Chester from Joplin after attending to some flu patients, Dr. Ewart was slightly scratched and bruised when his "tin Lizzie" struck something and turned turtle. We are not familiar with the details of the mishap, but - a - keep both hands on the wheel, Doc!

During the last three months of 1918 there were 37,567 cases of influenza.

27 June 1919 - Delicious four course dinner served, after which cards and dancing at a gathering to bid adieu to Dr. Melvin who leaves soon for California to reside permanently. It was held at the Assembly Hall of the Athletic Club.

5 Sept. 1919 - If you want your toilet cleaned, see Dr. Ewart. Fugle is on his vacation.

7 May 1920 - Donald Fugle had the misfortune to have his right arm broken Tuesday evening while cranking his Ford. Dr. Ewart dressed it for him and he is able to be around, of which we are all glad to hear.

19 Aug. 1921 CHESTER DEMOCRAT - Anton Larson, who is a patient at the local hospital is recovering nicely from the wounds received when his horses which were hooked to a binder ran away last week. He will be able to go to his home north of Lothair Friday.

Mrs. John Spaberg was brought in from her home south of Inverness last Saturday for treatment. She is being taken care of by Miss Mary Graham, whose home during this summer has virtually been turned into a local hospital.

28 Nov. 1921 - Doctor Ewart was called to the Bellfield home 25 miles north of Inverness Tuesday to minister to Mr. Bellfield, who has suffered a paralytic stroke.

Oct. 1931 - Dr. W.G. Hough of Chester underwent a major operation at the Sacred Heart Hospital in Havre Tuesday.

28 May 1932 - COUNTRY DOCTOR TAKES A DRIVE Monday night about eleven P.M. the Chester garageman rang Dr. Free's telephone and asked if he was in the market for a thirty mile drive to Robert Lehrman's home place between the old Sullivan ranch and the Sweet Grass Hills. Thirty mile drives over spring roads are doctor's favorite fruit! Nothing happened, except water in the gas and the driver works for Charlie Smith and knew how to draw off the bootlegged water through the good, old Dodge's gozzle and the trip was made in plenty of time for the birth of a fine baby girl to Chester Rudolph's wife. 6 June 1935 - DR. FREE, FOUND GUILTY: GIVEN TEN YEARS, \$1,000 FINE Dr. James K. Free, was convicted Monday night in District Court at Chester of unlawful sale of narcotics to Fred Brown, an informer for the Federal Narcotic Bureau. Judge C.B. Elwell pronounced sentence Tuesday morning of the ten years in the State penitentiary and \$1,000 fine.

13 June 1935 SHELBY PROMOTOR - CLAUSEN WILL START DRUG STORE IN SHELBY J.K. Clausen, of Chester, has leased the office quarters in the McCrohan building now occupied by County Assessor W.T. Evans and when the new courthouse is available will establish a drug store here. Mr. Clausen was proprietor of the Rexall Drug Store at Chester for many years. He has spent the past year in California.

26 Sept. 1935 LIBERTY COUNTY FARMER - HOSPITAL Now open for business at the Methodist parsonage in Chester. A registered gradyate nurse is in charge. The institution is under the supervision of Dr. Lande. See Dr. Lande for reservations and terms, or see Miss Carroll at hospital.

16 Jan. 1936 - J.K. Clausen who formerly owned a drug store at Chester has established a like business at Shelby. He left Chester after losing his business in a fire in 1931. Most of the fixtures have already been installed and drug and other stock has been arriving daily. Included in the new fixtures is a beautiful 14 foot soda fountain and back bar. It is of the latest design and cost more than \$3,000. Mr. Clausen states that the store will carry a full line of Rexall goods. This place of business will be known as the Clausen Drug Store. He is a registered pharmacist as is also Harry Ames who arrived here this week from Great Falls. Clausen decided Montana was the best place to be.

20 Feb. 1936 - Dr. L.E. Lande, Physician & Surgeon appointed County Health Officer - Chester.

MONTANA MAGAZINE - COUNTRY NURSE by Earlene Meyer In the early 1930s, medical care often was scarce in Montana. But in Chester, a small town on the Hi-Line, a young nurse and a doctor achieved a level of medical service that was unusual.

Ann Carroll had graduated in 1932 from Saint Vincent's Hospital School of Nursing in Billings. For about two years she worked as a private duty nurse. In June of 1934 she found herself between patients, so she and her widowed mother traveled to Joplin, a tiny town 10 miles east of Chester, to visit one of Ann's sisters.

There, Ann was approached by three businessmen who had learned of her background. They wanted her to open a hospital, explaining that the previous doctor and nurse had been convicted of drug violations and sent to prison. The clinic equipment had been stored in one of the businessman's buildings, so Ann would have something to start with if she agreed to the proposition. Ann talked with her family and with Dr. Lande, who had been covering the Chester-Joplin-Lothair area, and who would be affiliated with Ann's undertaking. They decided on Chester as the location for the clinic.

In Chester Ann and the doctor found an abandoned parsonage in which to begin their medical practice. Ann's mother joined them as an assistant and housekeeper. The little clinic became an emergency and maternity hospital. Patients in need of extensive surgery or those with illnesses requiring full hospital care were transferred to Havre. Ann and the doctor delivered babies, treated injuries, and performed tonsillectomies.

Ann's initial investment came to about \$600 plus the furniture and household possessions she and her mother had shipped from Billings. Despite access to the previous doctor's equipment, Ann had to improvise to gain basic necessities. The first hospital beds were regular beds that Ann had borrowed from local residents. As she began to make some money, she bought hospital beds, one at a time, and eventually she owned 10 beds. She created baby bassinets from laundry baskets, painted them white, and lined them with flannel and padding. To keep the babies warm she used bootleg whiskey bottles found stored in a basement in Joplin. Filled with hot water and tucked between layers of flannel and padding, they kept the new borns cozy. High school students built bedside tables in shop class. The parsonage's old rolltop desk held medications and surgical supplies.

Eventually, to gain space, Ann moved her hospital out of the parsonage and into an old boarding house. The doctor visited every day, but he also made house calls - in the winter he had to get around on a tractor. Because of the harshness of the winters, pregnant women arrived at the hospital a week or two before delivery. They did not "take to bed" but rather boarded for a dollar a day. When they delivered their babies they were assigned a bed and became patients.

The living conditions were not unusual for 1934 in Montana. Ann's mother cooked meals on a wood stove, and the reservoir on the back of the stove provided instant hot water. Ann owned an electric wringer type washer, a blessing with all the laundry generated by a hospital. In the summer, clothes were hung outside. In winter, however, they dried in the attic. There, temperatures often dropped so low that the clothes froze dry. In a letter to a family member in Joliet, Ann wrote: "It's so cold you need to take a blow torch to the outhouse with you to make sure you have a way to get up when you're done".

One of her patients became so ill she suggested his sons come from California to be with him. One of those boys, Edward Cain, fell in love with Ann and they were married. She sold her hospital and moved with her husband to California and continued in the nursing profession until her retirement.

#### December 1936 - Dr. Delaney, Chester

17 March 1938 LIBERTY COUNTY TIMES - HOSPITAL

The house will be made modern in every way and will be reconditioned inside and out. Mrs. Knutson is coming with sufficient equipment and supplies to do business as soon as two of these rooms can be put in proper shape, which will be about April 5th. Mrs. Knutson is a graduate of the Deaconess Hospital of Great Falls and has had several years of practice in hospitals, doctor's offices, and special duty nursing.

7 April 1938 - The Chester Hospital, taking advantage of the greatly improved telephone service lately installed a phone in the hospital - for the hospital. Call No. 18. Improvement a mark of the new hospital - looks as though we had something - just a little home patronage is all it needs to make it permanent.

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22 April 1938 - BENEFIT DANCE FOR HOSPITAL A movement is on foot to have a big dance in the High School gym for the benefit of the Mary Lynn hospital, Sunday, June 4th is the date decided on for the dance.

John Keldrauk and son, John are carpentering at the hospital; Roy Goodbar is wiring the place and Ed Ross is painting. The hospital is rapidly being transformed into an ideal place for those ailing. 5 May 1938 LIBERTY COUNTY TIMES - Mary Lynn Hospital sure looks something in its new coat of white paint on the outside and fine new painted rooms on the inside. Just what the old towns has needed for many years. Inside is one of the most accomplished nurses in Montana. When the painting and re-arranging is done it will be about as neat and nifty as desired.

12 May 1938 - BORN, to Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Ross at the Mary Lynn Hospital on May 9th, a bright little baby girl - Dr. Delaney attending physician.

Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Ross are receiving a visit from his mother, Mrs. George Ross of Rexford. She says the rest of the Ross family are in good health and happy, having spent a fine winter up in the mountains.

26 May 1938 - HOSPITAL DRESSING UP. New coats of paint outside, rooms partitioned off and everything nice and new and clean down at Mary Lynn Hospital make our institution for the care of the sick something to be proud of.

2 June 1938 - City Dads are having a new grade scraped out between the Roosevelt Service Station and the hospital.

9 June 1938 - Dr. M.F. Keller, Optometrist of Great Falls will be at the Chester Hotel on Thursday, June 30. Please make appointments at the Chester Hotel.

14 July 1938 - Mrs. Barrett, Proprietor of Mary Lynn hospital at Chester enjoyed a pleasant visit from her sister and family, Mr. and Mrs. A.R. Dickson of Klamath Falls, Oregon, who were on their way back to their homes on the coast from a visit in Iowa. They stopped over night at the hospital and the next morning they continued on their homeward journey. Mrs. Dickson is a former Chester girl, and graduated from the Chester High School in 1922 as Miss Viola Hull.

#### 4 Aug. 1938 - THE HOSPITAL BECOMING A BEAUTY SPOT

Mary Lynn Hospital deserves a generous hand from the people of Liberty County. It is slowly becoming a beauty spot, introducing visitors to the city. This once unsightly building is now a beauty spot by the roadside. Well painted and repaired, surrounded by gravel driveways and newly planted shrubbery, and shimm-ering with neatness inside. It is an institution of which our people may well be proud.

#### 24 Nov. 1938 - HOSPITAL IMPROVES SERVICE

Mary Lynn Hospital continues to improve its service - this time with a new automatic oil heating system which is being installed by the Shelby Sheet Iron Works. These mechanics have been working down there for several days and will have it all ready in a few more days. This is a long stride forward for the hospital.
