

INVERNESS CEMETERY

Upon the death of Alphonse and Rose (Mader) White's daughter, Margaret Susan White, in October 1912, the White's donated a parcel of their homestead to be used as a Catholic Cemetery. This land is located in the northeast corner of the section 2 miles east of Inverness, adjacent to U.S. Highway #2, on the south side of the road.

The Inverness Protestant Cemetery WAS located just 1 mile west of the Catholic one, in the northwest corner of the same section of land, also on the south side of the highway.

In 1975, the Hill County Cemetery Board ordered the Protestant Cemetery, which had long been abandoned and unkept, to be closed. It was combined with the Catholic Cemetery and is now a community cemetery. All interees from the Protestant Cemetery were ordered to be relocated. Some were moved to Havre, some to Joplin, or to other locations determined by the survivors of these early-day pioneers. All evidence of this Protestant Cemetery have been erased and the land reverted to farmland. So the present cemetery is an incorporation of the Catholic and Protestant Cemeteries, both of which had been established in the early homestead days.

Margaret Susan White was the first body to be place in the cemetery. However, an earlier dated grave is now there due to the relocation of the Protestant Cemetery occupants.

The Inverness Community Cemetery is still 'active' and receives burials although many local families prefer to utilize the Havre Cemetery. The cemetery was chain-link fenced, water piped in and a few trees planted in the 1970's.

Inverness is located on U.S. Highway #2, near mile marker # 337, 13 miles east of Chester, is in western Hill County and approximately 40 miles south of the Canadian border. It was founded and named by James (Scotty) Watson, a foremen on the Great Northern Railroad as it was being built through our town. Scotty died in 1938 and was buried in the old Protestant Cemetery. He was moved to the present Community Cemetery in September 1975.

Today Inverness is but a 'ghost' of what it once was as far as businesses go. There remains a school, 2 churches, a grocery, bar/supper club, elevators, fire hall, upholstery shop, post office, service station and bulk fuel and tire distributor, 40 residences and 9 teacherages. Inverness has had schools from the earliest days and which soon had a 2-year high school. In 1921 Inverness graduated the first 4 students from it's 4-year high school, making it one of the first 4-year high schools along the Hi-Line.



However, there is no marker on a grave indicating this transferral.

In addition to Scotty, there are approximately 15 other graves that are unidentified.

THE PRAIRIE INN

If walls could talk, how much history could be recorded about the people and times who stayed at the historic Prairie Inn built in Chester sometime before 1910. Many a tale has been woven about the goings on at the majestic hotel which housed early land developers from Jim Hill to John D. Rockefeller (signatures found in the hotel register at the Liberty County Museum.) Nearly all the settlers who came to look over land available to homesteaders on the early 1900's were lodged at the Prairie Inn which stook across from the depot.

The following excerpts following the rise and decline of the Inn were taken from "The Chester Signal" one of Chester's earliest newspapers.

November 14, 1907 - the sale of the Wilbur Building occupied as a saloon run by E. A. Engstrom was sold to B. B. Weldy who announced plans to remodel the property into a first class hotel. The new hotel opened for business in August of 1908 with Mrs. John Keith housekeeper and B. B. Weldy proprietor. A large addition was added that fall - a storeroom and barroom on the first floor and "15 bedrooms up", two bathrooms and hot water heat -- total cost \$3000.00

November 1908 - Dr. L. A. Harris took temporary residence in the Prairie Inn. By November, 1908, the addition had become three stories with 22 bedrooms on each of the upper floors besides a parlour and bathrooms.

February 1909 - a Grand Cosstume Ball in Weldy's Hall - supper 50¢ dancers \$1.00 spectators 25¢ and a fine for act wearing a mask.

May 1909 - Mrs. Rose Lutz of Missouri became housekeeper, Harrington was in charge of the dining room. Later in May Mrs. John Reick and daughterwtook over the dining room.

June 1909 - Miss Mildred Hall is employed at the Prairie Inn.

July 1909 - Guests inc uded many who filed on claims as well as those already established in the area -- Mrs. Joe Roke, Miss Mae Nutt, L. A. Nutt, J. B.. Hay, F. J. Stewart, C. . Slade, Clarence Langley, Axel T. Johnson. C. M. Atkins announced temporary quarters of The First State Bank of Chester would be in the Prairie Inn. August 1909 - Fifty guests for dinner at the Prairie Inn and that is not unusual. the new dining room seats 75 people comfortably. The Homestead Land Co., M. A. Johnson, agent, is located in the Prairie Inn.

September 1909 - Thirty-five names registered this week - it requires the services of seven people to take care of the business. Clincki Brothers, plasterers and bricklayers of Havre are at work on the Inn.

November 1909 - a new 30x50 addition is planned. Douglas Parker is night clerk. W. M. Mitche 1 is head cook. Mr. Montgomery, Malta dentist, will be at the Prairie Inn on a regular basis. O. J. Hanson, land locator, will open an office in the Inn as will M. D. Reip who is in real estate.

December 1909 - Arrangements are being made to add 80 feet to the east wing along Pennsylvania Avenue. There will be four storerooms on the lower floor - 30 more bedrooms on the upper floors. G. D. Hartwell from Bay City, Mich.. is barber at the Inn. Chester Realty Co (J. A. Foley, Otto Grice, Moscow, Idaho and B. B. Weldy). has an office in the Prairie Inn. W. H. Melvin, M.D. opened his office there also.

February 1910 - The New Prairie Inn - 45 rooms, steam heat, cafe open at 6 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Mrs. L. Hendrickson of Zortman, Mt. showing hats at the Inn. M arch 1910 - James Sullivan is tending bar at the Prairie Inn.

April 1910 - The bar at the Prairie Inn has been leased to Chas Hueber. June 1910 - The dining room has been moved to the east room 30x60 with plastered walls, hardwood floors and steel ceiling. Seating capacity of 100 plus a 16 foot lunch counter and a soda fountain. Jens Bakke is night clerk but resigned and was replaced by Milam Keith. Major R. R. Grear is day clerk, C. B. Woodmas is night mixologist. Later Charles Buckmaster leased the barroom.

The Prairie Inn, cont'd.

April 1911 - Mrs. Nellie Raycroft took charge of the Prairie Inn. October 1911- the dining room of the Prairie Inn is temporarily closed. Mrs. Thos. Keith has leased the Prairie Inn.

November 1911 - Miss Youell and Miss Slade have moved their departments of the Chester School to the east room of the Prairie Inn.

March 1912 - Mrs. D. L. Kelley took charge of the Inn. Mr. and Mrs. Keith moved to their farm near Alma.

June 1912 - Jim Dow rents hotel

August 1912 - Dr. Buisson is resident dentist at the Prairie Inn. Wm. F. Johnston rents the hotel.

November 1912 - F. D. Bieber and wife rent Prairie Inn.

December 1912 - Freuen and Dorris will give a dance at the Praire Inn on New Year's Eve.

September 1913 - Rev. Kelley, the new pastor of the Methodist Church, arrived and is headquartering at the Prairie Inn.

October 1913 - Geo. Morkrid and wife leased the Prairie Inn.

May 1914 - Hotel for Rent!

November 1914 - Rooms at the Prairie Inn are closed by apartments can be rented. Druggist Clausen has moved into an apartment at the Inn.

January 1915 - the Prairie Inn will soon be reopened.


November 1915 - Thanksgiving Ball - Phil Zettle's 4 piece orchestra - violin, trombone, clarinet and piano. Supper by Henry Schneiter.

January 1917 - New Year's Eve Dance - Zettle's "Live Wire" orchestra with Phil Zettle on the violin, Lee Pettit on trombone, Mrs. James Dow on piano and Walter Zeran on drums.

When the Prairie Inn closed for good is not found in newspapers. It is known ; that sometime in the 1920's the hotel was torn down and some of the lumber used by Charlie Swank to build a barn.

December 1927 - E. J.. Blanchard opened a complete oil service station on the site of the historic old Prairie Inn.

The story of Lettie Farrell Fitzsimonds

William Fitzsimonds (Feb. 1859 - 1907)

(son of Henry Fitzsimonds and Catherine Morrison; b. Huntingdon, Quebec,) m. Laura ???

Homesteaded at Elm Creek, Neb., also in the Neb, panhandle, still later a railway builder in the Black Hills.

Lettie's daughter: Louise, b. ca 1907.

Louise m. Ted Stevenson ca 1925 (Missouri??)

(The Stevensons and the Farrells were known to have lived in the Glacier Park area in the summer of 1935, likely in the guiding and outfitting business.)

We are told that Lettie died a horrible death soon after our known dates, by falling into a vat of boiling water as she prepared to help her husband scald a butchered hog. We have not been able to locate her death records in Helena, nor the exact location of the ranch

It is believed that Charlie Farrell may have become mentally deranged from shock and grief after his wife's death.

We have not been able to locate Lettie's daughter Louise Stevenson (who had at least one son, born ca 1926).

Can anyone give us any information which would help us find this branch of the family?

It was with great surprise that I noted the name "Charlie Farrell" among the scholars at Pleasant View School in 1899 (see p. 48, Tri-County Searcher, Vol. e, no. 1).) Could this be more than co-incidence?

Any suggestions that anyone can give us re this family group will be welcome.

This was taken from the Red Lake Falls Gazette, Red Lake Falls, Minn. March 16, 1905 and might be of some information to people that are researching anyone Swedish. "Notce has been sent to the Swedish legation in Washington that hereafter all SWEDES who marry in any foreign country must get permission from their diplomatic representative if they wish their marriage to be legally recognized in Sweden. The action is due to the fact that many Swedes have been going to nearby countries where it was easy to get divorces, and marrying again, sometimes under the conditions that would not be allowed in Sweden. When a Swede living in the United States wishes to be married and return to his mative land, he must apply for permission to the minister in Washington, who, if everything is in accordance with the laws of Sweden, will issue a certificate to that effect. This certificate must be produced when the couple return to Sweden".

FROM EARLY NEWSPAPERS RIVER PRESS Fort Benton, Mont.

Jan. 23, 1889 -- Monday's Daily

Born On the reservation, January 17, 1889, to Mr. and Mrs. Man-That-Carries-His-Gun-With-Him, a son, weighing 27 pounds and 10 ounces. This may seem a very large child, but it must be borne in mind that it is a large reservation.

Jan. 23, 1889 Messrs. M. McAndrews, Frank Stiles and Leander Alexander, all of Chamberlain, Dakota, are guests at the Overland hotel, having just arrived from the Sweet Grass hills, where they have taken up their residence with the intention of building homes in that favored section. We learn the gentlemen are much pleased with the Sweet Grass region. Besides being a fine mining country, they find it especially adapted to agriculture coupled with stock raising. Montana, and especially the great northern Indian reservation will rob Dakota of a large number of her people this season. We hear that the "Montana fever"

is epidemic in our big sister territory.

Feb. 13, 1889 Mr. R. J. Porter, of Porter & Hazeltine, owner of the famous Brown-Eyed Queen mining claim in the Sweet Grass Hills, returned to the city this morning from Fort Assinaboine where he had gone to see his partner. Mr.

Porter will start back to the hills tomorrow.

Mr. R. J. Porter, of the Sweet Grass mines, arrived to-day, and we saw him weighing out sveral lots of Sweet Grass placer gold at the Bank of Northern Montana, which he was exchanging for currency. Mr. Porter reports every thing progressing nicely at the Hills. A little winter placer mining is being done, the fine weather admitting of it. Considerable work is being done on the quartz leads in the different districts, and some fine properties are being developed. The miners have great faith in the camp, and are satisfied that it will not be long before they have the Galt railway running in close proximity to their mines, which will add greatly to their value by enabling them to sell or ship their ores as they may choose. It is learned that some English capitalists lately paid that section a vist with a view of finding a suitable location for a large smelting plant. It is supposed that Sir Alexander T. Galt is at the head of the scheme, as one of his well known

agents was with the party. The party returned to the Canadian Pacific railway after a thorough examination of the mines and tributary country. The visit of this party was kept very quiet, Many of the miners not knowing anything about their presence, and others being told that the gentlemen were simply out on a hunting trip and to look over the country with a veiw of engaging in the livestock business. It is claimed that one of the Baring brothers, of London, was one of the party. It will be remembered that several years ago three of the Baring brothers outfitted at Fort Benton and paid that country a visit.

Apr. 10.1889 From Saturday's Daily

Mr. Clifford Martin of the Marias, met with a painful acciden a day or two ago. He was leading a horse to water down a steep bank when the animal stumbled and fell, striking Mr. Martin on the ankle bruising and spraining it badly. He came in yesterday and is under the doctor's care.

W. G. Smith, of the Marias, was circulating a petition yesterday, asking for a station house, postoffice and telegraph operator at the Marias river. These are much needed by the numerous settlers in that section and we sincerely trust the Manitoba railway and the government will grant the petitions. Mr. R. W. Garland is suggested as station agent, Postmater and operator, and he is the right man for these positions.

Mr. John Stark, a wool grower from the middle butte of the Sweet Grass hills was in the city yesterday and loaded his wagon with supplies which will be needed at the approaching lambing and shearing season. He went into the Sweet Grass country last fall and says his sheep have been hog fat all winter. He will, of course, market his wool clip at Fort Benton. In conversation with the gentleman, he mentioned the fact that a ferry was badly needed on the Marias at some point as near as may be in a direct line

from Fort Benton to the east and middle buttes. He says that the upper ferry is somewhat too far west for the accommodation of the people of his section. Here is an opening for some enterprising man to put in a ferry and a stopping place.

Apr. 17, 1889 Wednesday's Daily

We learn that a fifteen year old son of a Mr. Martin a relative of Mr. John Zimmerman, died at the family residence on the upper Marias Friday last April 5th. We regret that we are with out further particulars.

Apr. 24, 1889

Mine host, Julius Horst of the Park hotel, Great Falls, accompanied by Mr. John Renner of that city arrived by last night's train. They hired a carriage and left for the Sweet Grass Hills this morning. It is said they have their keen financial optics on a certain silver-copper lead mine in that section.

It is a well known fact that our friend, Mr. Julius Horst, proprietor of the Park Hotel, Great Falls, is an old practical miner and mining superintendent. As before noted he come down here Friday evening in company with Mr. John Renner, and left by private conveyance Saturday morning for the Sweet Grass hills to inspect the mines of that district. One mine especially, the Brown-Eyed Queen, the property of Porter & Hazeltine, will engage his attention. This is the silver-copper lead from which the owners sent a working sample to the Anaconda smelter a few weeks ago, that proved to be so rich in both silver and copper. Mr. Horst's visit may, and we hope will, lead to a deal or several deals in mining property in that section. The Sweet Grass mines first attracted attention on account of their rich placer deposits. Prospecting for lead property followed and some very promising properties were discovered. Mining men all over

the territory are watching developments in that section very closely; and well they may for some as fine specimens of copper and silver ore as we have ever seen, were taken from top rock in the Sweet Grass mines.

May 8, 1889

Died-- At the Blackfeet boarding school Piegan, M. T., Wednesday, April 27th 1889, of quick consumption, Nannie daughter of J. D. Weatherwax, aged 14 years.

Mr. William Collins, of the Marias, today purchased of Mr. Frank Bain, 200 yearling heifers and 100 yearling steers, which had just arrived from the east over the Manitoba.

Mr. Frank Bain arrived from the east to-day with over 400 head of yearling heifers and milch cows as per published announcement. Before getting the cattle well off the train he had 350 head sold at satisfactory figures. He has some milch cows for sale. See ad.

May 22, 1889

John Wasesha, of the Marias, is in from his sheep ranch. He reports that his herd commenced lambing April 15th, and that he has suffered no loss on account of bad weather. His experience is that April is always a better month than May for young lambs.

Mr. and Mrs. John H. Green received a letter last evening bringing the glad tidings that a baby boy had been born to Mrs. Frank Leedy, a sister of Mrs. Green, which important event occurred at their home in the Little Prickly Pear valley on May 13th, 1889.

Mr. W. P. Turner, Jr., of the Marias, is expected to arrive by this evening's train. A cusin, Mr. Alvin Bickford, who has just graduated from college, will accompany him and spend a few months for his health. A lady, Mrs. Moore, of Washville, also comes for the purpose of engaging in the dairy business.
